In the spring of 1891, the family of David and Ida Eisenhower moved from Texas to Abilene, Kansas. Dwight D. Eisenhower was the third of their seven sons and was only a few months old when his family _____ in Abilene. Dwight entered the first grade at Lincoln School in 1896. He was an above-average student, although not _____.

During his _____ years, Ike claimed that much of his education came from home. The Eisenhower's family _____ was for the children to take turns reading _____ from the Bible aloud to the family. Once a mistake was made, the _____ of reading was passed on to the next brother. This helped all the brothers learn to read clearly and _____.

The Eisenhower family moved into a larger home on Fourth Street during 1898. This new home had a large yard, and his father gave each son a _____ of land to use as a garden. Each of the Eisenhower boys could sell the vegetables grown for _____ money.

Since there were no daughters in the Eisenhower household, Ike and his brothers had to help their mother with such household _____ as washing dishes, laundry and even cooking. Ike developed _____ as a cook which he used throughout his life.

Ike attended Garfield Junior High School and then Abilene High School. He _____ playing baseball and football to classroom study. However, he had unusual skill in _____ and loved reading, especially books about Greek and Roman wars. Ike entered first grade with two hundred Abilene children and only 31 _____ from high school in 1909.

In 1911, Ike entered the United States Military Academy at West Point and at age 21 a famous military _____ was launched. Prior to his appointment to West Point, Ike's application to the U.S. Naval Academy at Annapolis was _____ because at age twenty, he was too old to enter the Naval Academy.

Dwight D. Eisenhower was _____ the 34th President of the United States on November 4, 1952 and served until January 20, 1961 at the age of seventy. He died on March 28, 1969 and is _____ in Abilene, Kansas.

He founded Travel Air Manufacturing Co. in 1924, which was the forerunner of a company he started in Wichita in 1932.






