# FALL BRINGS CHANGES TO THE TEACHERS COLLEGE

If this quotation is true, then The Teachers College is well positioned for the implementation of a bold product, procedure or structure! Although we are still in the fall semester of this new academic year, significant changes have occurred throughout the college. Our opening fall faculty meeting welcomed 15 new faculty to The Teachers College. Their names and divisions are listed on the following page. The past two years have witnessed nearly a 40% turnover in faculty in the college. In addition to the fresh new faces, these individuals also have brought forth many innovative ideas for improving the quality of our programs.

Divisions in the college also have undergone change. The Division of Teacher Education has been renamed the Division of Early Childhood/Elementary Teacher Education. Educational Administration is now School Leadership/ Middle and Secondary Teacher Education. And we now house a brand new division – Instructional Design and Technology. These three division changes will facilitate

increased communication among faculty and staff, position the college to implement the Redesign of Teacher Licensure currently under review by the Kansas State Board of Education, and hopefully cluster faculty expertise in units ready to respond to the ever-changing needs of our constituents in the field.

Another change is our increasing use of technology as an instructional tool. Five years ago, instruction was provided almost totally by faculty teaching in a single location. Today, it is not unusual to "beam" instruction to two or three locations simultaneously using two-way interactive instructional television. Other faculty are teaching at as many as 14 locations simultaneously via Telenet 2 - a computer based delivery system that provides visual and audio instruction. Still other faculty are teaching "virtual courses" through the internet. You'll find a variety of these "links" and enrollment opportunities throughout this issue.

The Division of Health, Physical Education and Recreation invited Mrs. Vickie Deines to serve as a Teacher in Residence during the fall 1996 semester. Vickie took leave from her duties as a K-12 physical education teacher in Hoxie, Kansas, to provide instruction in our elementary and secondary physical education methods classes. Our students have truly benefitted from the practical classroom experience Vickie has brought to the university setting.


In October, we welcomed Dr. Jeannie Kleinhammer-Tramill to the Jones Institute and The Teachers College. Jeannie is our new Director of Sponsored Research. In this role she will be preparing grant proposals for state, federal, and private funding and will be assisting faculty in the development of grant proposals.

The Teachers College continually has major accomplishments to celebrate. Three of these include:

- publication of more than 30 books written by Teachers College faculty during the past 18 months
- funding of grants exceeding \$500,000 during the 1995-96 academic year
- National Board for Professional Teaching Standards certification of 11 teachers prepared by the Great Plains Center for National Teacher Certification which is housed in the Jones Institute for Educational Excellence

As enumerated above, many changes have colored the structure, products, and procedures of The Teachers College during the past few months. To quote Vivian Bucher, "One change makes way for the next, giving us the opportunity to grow." We look forward to continued growth during the coming year.

# New Technology Master's Program Completes First Year

The Instructional Design and Technology (IDT) master's level program in The Teachers College has successfully guided graduate students through the program's first year. Designed for practicing teachers of grades preschool through 12 as well as other educators, the program helps educators learn to apply technology and related software to teaching problems and procedures encountered in working with students in a classroom setting. Noneducators have enrolled in the courses as well "just to learn more about applied technology," says Dr. Armand Seguin, acting chair of the new division.

The outlook for those who understand how to use technology in education is excellent. Schools and other organizations are greatly expanding their use of technology and are employing increasing numbers of professionally trained workers. Opportunities are available

in the private sector as well. Typical job possibilities include computer coordinator, distance learning specialist, Web developer, and staff development director.

The program utilizes the highlyqualified faculty from both The Teachers College and the School of Library and Information Management. Dr. Seguin describes the IDT faculty as very capable and creative, and is convinced they do a fine job. The division has a staff of five full-time faculty members with doctoral degrees from many of the top universities in the country, including Arizona State University, Boston University, the University of Illinois, and Virginia Polytechnical Institute and State University. Cumulatively, they have nearly 100 publications in education and technology, are in demand for consulting, and frequently give presentations at national conferences.

The IDT facilities include two instructional laboratories that contain more than 20 state-of-the-art workstations with full Internet connections. All hardware platforms are represented, and additional workstations and special software support multimedia and video productions.

Specific to this program, each student must meet a minimum computer competency level and have access to a computer and modem or Internet connection. #### Counselor Education and Rehabilitation Programs

# Early Childhood/Elementary Teacher Eduction

-In addition to its on-campus undergraduate programs, the division sponsors Professional Development Schools in Emporia and Olathe.
-The 1998 Kansas Reading Association State Conference will be held at ESU and hosted by the division. The keynote speaker will be Mem Fox.

#### Health, Physical Education and Recreation

-The Kansas Physical Activity and Wellness Curriculum Project has been re-funded for another two years through the Kansas Health Foundation. ESU will continue to serve as a training site.

-Jeff McAdoo from Quail Run Elementary in Lawrence, Kansas, will be the division's public school physical education teacher-in-residence for the Spring 1997 semester.

#### Instructional Design and Technology

-The division currently has 25 graduate students enrolled in the IDT master's program.

Psychology and Special Education

 In May 1996, the revised Art Therapy curriculum was approved after two years of deliberation. Faculty have been working with the largest group of new art therapy students in the

history of the program as well as making transition arrangements for the students currently in the program. The new AT course prefix will debut in the Spring 1997 course schedule.

-The Master of Science degree program in Art Therapy received national accreditation for the next

program in Art Therapy received national accreditation for the next seven years from the American Art Therapy Association.

#### School Leadership/Middle and Secondary Teacher Education

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# PROFESSOR ESTABLISHES TRUST FUND

Dr. Carol Marshall, professor of early childhood education, recently established the

Carol F. Marshall Trust Fund to improve services to early childhood professionals who work with at-risk and minority students. The trust serves to assist very young children and the teachers who work with them. It also is dedicated to increasing the number of minorities in the field of education.

Dr. Marshall established the Marshall Trust Fund in memory of her parents, Dr. Cameron F. Marshall, a former public school teacher and doctor of obstetrics and gynecology, and Mrs. Frances Allen Marshall, a public school teacher.

According to Dr. Marshall, she "intended the trust to place an emphasis on the importance of young children, the parenting they receive, and their educational environments."

Annual funding is provided to support research proposals and professional development activities which focus on creative and unique projects that ultimately help children. Proposals are accepted and reviewed in November and March. Members of the profession, representing NCATE, determine which schools, colleges, and departments of education measure up to these demanding standards for teacher preparation. Only after a comprehensive examination of all facets of the teacher preparation program is NCATE accreditation awarded.
