NEW CONCEPTUAL FRAMEWORK FOR THE TEACHERS COLLEGE

If you graduated from The Teachers College between 1992 and 2009, you might remember the expression "Critical Thinker, Creative Planner, and Effective Practitioner." This expression was the college's Conceptual Framework or the philosophy guiding academic programs (both education and other programs), student performance, courses, teaching, and faculty scholarship and service. During the 2008-09 academic year, a group of faculty deliberated on a new Conceptual Framework for preparing our graduates, building on the legacy of excellence in the college while honoring its traditions. In April 2009, the committee presented their recommendation, which was discussed across the college and honed during the Fall 2009 semester with final approval in November. Very little was changed to the group's original recommendation, which is a tribute to the inspired work of the members of the group. The college is indebted to them for their

The philosophical basis for the new Conceptual Framework comes from the scholarship of Lee

Shulman, former President of the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching. Shulman observed mature professions like education, medicine, religion, engineering, and the law, were identified by six characteristics that set the terms for the challenge of educating professionals. These six



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characteristics form the basis for the six proficiencies in the new Conceptual Framework now guiding the preparation of teachers and other professionals in the college: providing service to society, applying interdisciplinary scholarly knowledge, engaging in effective practice, responding to uncertainty and change, relying on self-reflection, and belonging to professional community.

As the Conceptual Framework neared completion, the university's graphic designer developed several images to represent the framework in an easily accessibly manner. The continued on page 2



images were critiqued by a variety of committees late in the Fall 2009 semester. At the college's Spring 2010 faculty meeting, Dean Phil Bennett unveiled the new Conceptual Framework image, which includes the globe to reflect the importance of preparing our candidates to thrive in world that is becoming smaller:



Each proficiency has its respective list of indicators of candidate knowledge, practical ability, and dispositions, including proficiencies associated with diversity and technology, that are aligned with the expectations in professional, state, and institutional standards. A small sampling of the 48 indicators includes exhibiting knowledge of diversity, integrating knowledge across and within disciplines, and committing to help all children succeed.

The college is now in transition to the new conceptual framework. Besides guiding course work, the six proficiencies become the architecture for key assessments such as the University Supervisor Assessment Form for Student Teachers and Interns and orientation for student teachers and PDS interns.

SCHOOL NAMED FOR ALUMNA

An alumna now has an elementary school named after her. Bonnie Wilkinson was honored in late 2009 at Bonnie Wilkinson Elementary School in the Conroe Independent School District in Conroe, TX.

Her career in education started while attending a rural high school in Morrowville, KS: a teacher became ill and Wilkinson, a senior at the time, stepped in to serve as her substitute. She also served as a secretary for the high school principal, earning 25 cents an hour. After graduation, she borrowed \$200 from her grandmother to earn a provisional teaching certificate from Emporia State Teachers College. That fall, at the age of 17, she taught her first term as a teacher of grades one through eight. In 1968 she earned her bachelor's degree and later a master's degree.

She has served also as a counselor, assistant principal, and principal. As a principal at a new school in Conroe in 1990, a teacher said she arrived one morning to find Wilkinson on her hands and knees scrubbing the carpet at the school – saying she not only wanted the school to be the best but to look the best too.

MEHRHOF HONORED

Dr. Joella Mehrhof was awarded the National Association for Sport and Physical Education's Outstanding Mentor of the Year Award.

In March, Mehrhof, professor of health, physical education and recreation at ESU, was recognized for what students and colleagues call a tireless commitment to the success of her students.

Mehrhof has been called "a role model of professionalism" by colleagues. Mehrhof's 26-year career at ESU has been distinguished by service to state, regional and national organizations dealing

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with physical education. Her mentoring work includes accompanying more than 100 students to AAHPERD conventions during the past five years.

All their classroom learning, collaboration and idea-sharing had been done online. Ermis and Gibson, as master's degree students, competed with students from doctoral degree programs.

EDUCATION FACULTY AWARDS

In January, three members of The Teachers College faculty at ESU were honored by the college for their work.

Excellence in instruction - Elizabeth Dobler, associate professor in elementary teacher education, has earned a reputation from her students as a rigorous, but very fair and practical instructor in her elementary reading and language arts courses.

Excellence in scholarly activity - Matt Seimears, assistant professor in early childhood/elementary teacher education, has published in a number of scholarly venues, from refereed state

and national journals to co-authoring several books within the last two years.

Darrell E. Wood Service Award - Dee Holmes, instructor in elementary teacher education, is noted for her professional wisdom, support and advice. Students regard her as a sounding board for all manner of professional and personal issues and questions. Each year The Teachers College presents the Darrell E. Wood Service Award to an individual who has supported the mission of the college in a unique or outstanding manner.

LAUNCHING OF DUAL DEGREE PROGRAM WITH CHINA

ESU will be one of 17 public universities in the US participating in a program aimed at creating dual degree opportunities with selected universities in China. When ESU's participation begins in 2011, the Sino-American 1+2+1 Dual Degree Program will bring Chinese students to the ESU campus for two years of their college experience, as well as offer students and faculty from ESU opportunities to study in China.

This partnership will allow ESU to connect with new higher education institutions in China, identifying students who will participate in the exchange program. Chinese students will spend the first year of their college education in their native country as ESU identifies the courses needed during their second and third years on the Emporia campus. The students will spend the final year of their coursework back in their native country.

Dr. Marcus Childress, chair of ESU's Instructional Design and Technology department, will travel with ESU administrators to China in mid-June to participate in the 10th anniversary celebration of the AASCU/CCIEE 1+2+1 program as well as meet with colleagues from selected institutions.

STUDENTS BASE PROJECT ON GAME SHOW

As in the case of most learning exercises, both the students and the teachers come out on the winning side. And this year's Math Trails activity at Emporia Middle School serves as a case in point. Students in ESU's Math Methods classes built this year's Math Trails around "Price is Right" game show theme, with approximately 200 middle school students and parents circulating around a series of math games developed by the students.

The middle school students get a better understanding of math... and the college students take home a new bag of math tricks to try out on their classrooms when they become teachers.
